


## Collective Worship Planning - Thankfulness

<p><b>Definition:</b> <u>Christians believe that God loves and cares for them in many different ways in all aspects of their lives. They know that their response to this provision should be ones of thankfulness and praise.</u></p> <p>Thankfulness has always been at the centre of the life and worship of God's people. Under the Law of Moses, there were not only sacrifices for forgiveness, there were 'thanks offerings' as well. 'Songs of thankfulness and praise...' are at the heart of Christian worship. Thankfulness is directed towards God who gives and sustains life. Seeing the world as God's creation underpins the way we approach everything in life, seeing it as a gift and not as a right.</p>		<p><b>Key Bible Character - The unnamed woman</b></p>  <p>This woman has been living in a very unhappy life. She has made lots of mistakes and is clearly paying for them. When she knows that Jesus is in the area, she brings an incredibly expensive bottle of perfume that would have cost her everything. Without even speaking, she pours it on Jesus' feet, and even uses her own tears and hair to wash them. <p>I</p> <p>The ten lepers</p> <p>Lion Storyteller Bible – The Man who came back p. 124</p>	<p><b>Bible chapter and verse</b></p> <p>Luke 17:11-19 <a href="#">video</a></p>	<p>Luke tells the story of the ten lepers who were healed by Jesus. He is probably challenging his readers to examine themselves when he tells of the amazement of Jesus that only one, a Samaritan, came back to thank him. We need to remember to say thank you too.</p>

2	The last supper Lion Storyteller Bible – An important Meal p. 136	Mark 14: 22-23 <a href="#">video</a>	For most Christians, the Communion Service is an important moment when they say thank you to God. To show how important it was to one Christian, share the story of Buzz Aldrin, the second man on the moon. He wanted to express his faith and give thanks to God by taking Holy Communion on the moon!
4	A Gift of Perfume	Luke 7:38-50 <a href="#">video</a>	This woman has been living in a very unhappy life. She has made lots of mistakes and is clearly paying for them. 5	Creation Praise	Psalms 148 <a href="#">bible text</a> <a href="#">song</a> <a href="#">creation story</a>	Seeing the world as God's creation can underpin the way we approach everything in life, seeing it as a gift and a blessing and not as a right. This should apply to everything in God's world including the things that are really easy to overlook. Explain to the children the term 'taking things for granted'. If we are really thankful for the world we live in, then we need to show this by looking after it
6	David's Prayers	<a href="#">video</a> Psalm 100: 1-5	In the Psalms, no matter what David was facing, he outpoured gratitude to God. As he encountered good times and bad times, David always turned back to the truth of God's goodness. This attitude often carried him through the hardest of situations.
7	Daniel	Daniel 2:23 <a href="#">video</a>	King Nebuchadnezzar had a troubling dream. He couldn't understand it so demanded that the magicians and wise men of Babylon explain it to him. Nobody could except Daniel—who understands that this wisdom is given to him from God. Daniel thanks God when he shows him the meaning of the dream. He understood all wisdom comes from God. For interpreting the king's dream, Daniel is made the ruler of all Babylon's wise men.
8	Lazarus	John 11:41 <a href="#">video</a>	Right before raising Lazarus from the dead, Jesus thanks God for hearing him. Jesus often gave thanks to God before performing a miracle.

9	<p>Paul gets shipwrecked</p> <p>Lion Storyteller Bible – Paul is shipwrecked p. 156</p>	Acts 27 <a href="#">video</a>	<p>Paul's ship is about to be wrecked, and everyone aboard knows it. But that night, an angel appeared to Paul in a dream, assuring him no one would die. The storm raged on and the ship looked like it would be dashed against rocks. They dropped four anchors and prayed for daylight. No one had eaten for 14 days, and just before sunrise, Paul urged everyone to eat to regain strength. In the midst of the storm, Paul took bread, gave thanks to God before the entire ship, broke the bread and distributed it. The next day, all 276 aboard made it safely to shore. If Paul gave thanks not after the storm had passed, but right in the midst, we can give thanks in our storm as well.</p>
10	<p>Paul says thank you for his friends</p>	Ephesians 1:15-19 <a href="#">bible text</a>	<p>It is good to express our thankfulness to others. The Bible instructs us to encourage one another often. Paul, in his multiple letters to the churches he was leading, always reminds his friends how thankful he is for them. Usually, following his words of thanks are words of encouragement to help build them up. Thanks and giving go hand in hand. God can use us to share his love with others by simply sharing words of gratitude and support.</p>
11	<p>Jonah gave thanks in the belly of a fish.</p> <p>Lion Storyteller Bible – Jonah the Groaner p.66</p>	Jonah 2 <a href="#">video</a>	<p>God had told Jonah to go warn Nineveh. Instead, Jonah jumped on the next ship to Tarsus. When a violent storm threatened to capsize the ship, Jonah knew it was God's judgment for him and told the sailors to throw him overboard. He was promptly swallowed by a large fish. Jonah could have sulked or given up, but in the belly of the fish, he said sorry and thanked God. After Jonah's prayer with gratitude, God commanded the great fish to spit him up on dry land and Jonah headed to Nineveh to preach as God intended.</p>
