


The Polar Bear Explorer's Club

2) All her life, she has been plotting to steal the Crown Jewels, and now she needs Ben's help...






Sam Wu is NOT Afraid of Ghosts Kevin Tsang

From the number one author for animal magic comes this wonderful new edition of a much-loved classic.






A Boy and a Bear in a Boat Dave Shelton
